

Meeting Report

Guest Speaker - Sonia Codd

Sonia Codd from Nature Connect, Puketapu, was accompanied by her Senior Manager, Robyn an ex school teacher, to speak about her passion, Early Childhood Education Exploring Nature.

Sonia was born in Hastings, educated in Napier, and graduated with degree in Early Childhood Education. After a few years teaching young children, she decided to venture out on her own to establish Nature Connect, where she has been working for the last 6 years. Her company encourages old and young children to explore nature using their own initiatives to learn about seeds, flowers, plants, trees, rivers, and forests.

The children aged between 3 years and 13 years attend 10 times per term during school hours as part of children's education. There are many outdoor activities which children pursue individually or in groups. An example given was one group decided to build a dam on the small stream. Some participants take part in art, knitting, carving, gardening, growing vegetables, or just climbing trees. The children finish up being muddy, dirty, and wet, but that would be normal to them.

The children are taught Kindness and Respect, and the young ones learn from the older ones and the older ones still learn from the younger ones. There are a lot of books that are read regularly, and many activities going on all at once. There are usually up to 28 children there at a time, some from as far north as Kinloch Taupo, and Dannevirke in the south. There is a building there, where they meet before venturing out to do their own things. When the children arrive at the nature park, they will all meet for a briefing for supervisors to explain the rules, and remind them about kindness and respect.

Independence is self directed, with multilevel processing to aid the 5 senses, hearing, touching, seeing, tasting, and smelling. There are three dogs there to help children move on from fear of animals and dogs.

It is Environmental Education at its best, and it seems to be a must for all children to experience, if they are lucky.




