

Meeting Report

Stuart Batty – Rotary New Zealand World Community Service (RNZWCS)

Our speaker this week was Stuart Batty. Stuart has an impressive CV with past association with many organisations including Rotary. He spoke to us about Rotary New Zealand World Community Service (RNZWCS) of which he is Executive Director. He explained that the organisation has three main areas of work being Disaster Relief, International Development, and Partner Projects.



Disaster Relief

RNZWCS is responsible for Emergency Response Kits (which this club has sponsored in the past). Stuart gave us a brief history of the Emergency Response Kits and related how previously they started out as second hand objects brought in by the club members and collected into a kit to what they are now which is a brand new box of useful equipment. Along with the Emergency Response Kits the organisation does ship repurposed equipment to the Pacific such as desks and chairs for educational purposes or medical equipment. They've recently sent a 40 foot container full of such equipment to Tonga. In other humanitarian response work the organisation contributed significantly to the districts affected by Cyclone Gabriel and less recently have provided response to earthquake affected areas and the Ukraine war.

International Development

The organisation is involved in many projects globally that focus on helping the local communities to develop themselves. Stuart described the recent development of a dairy processing plant in Mweka in Tanzania. From a start of a few litres here and there brought to the plant in assorted containers (including

paint tins!) with training and incentives the project has developed so that is now processes over 7000 litres of milk a day. The small town where it is located has grown as a result.

Partner Projects

He explained that the New Zealand government through MFAT matches funds raised by the Rotary organisation 4 to 1 for some projects. There are many of these projects but they include a climate change project in Tonga, a science and technology museum in Apia sponsored by the Rotary Club of Apia and Polio Plus. \$12 million over the last 20 years has been provided towards Polio Plus by the New Zealand government.

LAST WEEK'S MEETING REPORT Brian Young Story and Something Different (SD)

Born Napier, educated Hastings Street School, Napier Intermediate, and NBHS. Left school at 15 to work in Fruit Retail Shop called Loo Kee Fruiterers, in Emerson St for 38 years. Also worked in various market gardens on the weekends as a commercial grower.

Spoke about boyhood experiences including seeing a dozen Rita Angus paintings in Alan Angus's house, now owned by a member of Napier Rotary. House not the artwork.

In 1995 changed vocation to be full time commercial grower, growing various types of sprouts to supply supermarkets. Sprouts were grown in automatic machines which watered seeds, until harvesting in 5 to 7 days. Sprouts were washed, dried, graded, packaged, labelled, and delivered to Pak n Saves or New World Supermarkets.

- (SD) Went on NZ group tour with 3 sons and 20 NZers to Oklahoma USA to watch 2 NBA basketball games. Pre game, dined with staff and Cheer Leader Girls (Photo Supplied)(P.S.) Then met 7 foot Steven Adams from NZ after the game(P.S.)
- (SD) Visited Thailand and made some dumb decisions. Paid to go into a cage with fully grown live tiger and pat him (P.S.) Then made a dumber decision when offered (Buy One, get one free) to double the tigers for same price. Silly to say no, so we had 2 live tigers and we were told to hold their tails(P.S.) In hindsight if something went wrong, then it was a really really dumb choice.
- (SD) Visited Disneyland and managed to ride every ride in Disneyland in the same day. It is only possible on the one day every year, which is the 4th Thursday in November called Thanksgiving Day. Everyone stayed at home, so very few people attended.
